NEW HOURS FOR IMMUNIZATION CLINICS

MILTON - Beginning July 1, all Florida Department of Health in Santa Rosa County Immunization Clinics will begin new hours of operation. Immunizations will be offered at the Milton location on Mondays and Thursdays, at the satellite clinic in Gulf Breeze on Tuesdays, and at the satellite clinic in Jay the first Wednesday of every month. The change in clinic hours is in response to a decline in demand for services as well as budget reductions.

DISASTER RECOVERY TIP #27: TIPS FOR A SAFE HOLIDAY

The Fourth of July is right around the corner. No matter where you're going, you'll have plenty of company as millions of Americans hit the road to get fireworks, attend barbecues and spend time with friends and family.

For those of you traveling this upcoming holiday, here are a few helpful tips from the [National Preparedness Coalition](#).

- Have copies of your travel documents and passports available with you. Make electronic copies for back-up purposes.
- [Check weather](#) for your vacation destination.
- Consider purchasing [travel insurance](#) when traveling to areas with known risks such as the Caribbean during hurricane season. Make sure natural disasters are covered in the travel insurance.
- Pack an [emergency kit](#) that includes first aid supplies and any prescriptions.
- Heed the warning. Follow the lead of local residents when warning siren or advisories are made.

CAN VOLUNTEERING HELP YOU WITH YOUR JOB SEARCH?

Can volunteering be the difference-maker in your next interview? New, ground-breaking research at the [Corporation for National and Community Service](#) (CNCS) provides evidence of a relationship between volunteering and finding employment.

Our new study, "[Volunteering as a Pathway to Employment](#)," found that those who were out of work and got involved with volunteering opportunities increased their likelihood of finding employment by 27 percent.

We are excited about these findings because it [highlights](#) an encouraging situation for both job seekers and the volunteer sector.

Consider Leanne's story. She is a military spouse who began volunteering to get involved with her new community when her family relocated to Florida from California. Her work with the Navy Marine Corps Relief Society as a financial counselor and managing volunteers created a passion that never faded as she moved from coast to coast with her family, and eventually led to a full-time position managing volunteers with her local American Red Cross.

Leveling the Playing Field

Volunteering makes a positive impression, and that can make a big difference in a competitive job market. It can be especially helpful for people with limited skills or connections, and help level the playing field.

For example, volunteers without a high school diploma improved their chances of finding employment by 51 percent, and [those in rural areas increased their chances of finding work by 55 percent](#).

In fact, volunteering improved the likelihood of success for job seekers across all demographic categories – such as age, race, and gender – geographic areas, and job market conditions, and the findings held across the 10-year period analyzed in our study. That is amazing!

SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

Summer is here and for many residents, much time will be spent outside. Here are some summer safety tips to help keep yourself and your family safe while enjoying the season. Don't let an accident caused by carelessness ruin your outdoor fun.

Fireworks

Florida law, only sparklers approved by the Division of State Fire Marshal, are legal for consumer usage **anytime of the year**. Sparklers should bear the wording "emits a fountain or shower of sparks." Aerial devices are prohibited. **A good rule of thumb is if it flies or explodes, it is not legal in Florida.** Using illegal fireworks is a first-degree misdemeanor, and is a crime punishable by a \$1,000 fine and up to one year in jail.

The safest way to enjoy fireworks with your family is to participate in one of the public fireworks displays offered throughout Santa Rosa County. Local displays include:

- Santa Rosa County Tourist Development & Navarre Beach Area Chamber Foundation, Thursday, July 4, the fireworks will originate from the Black Skimmer Pavilion parking lot in the county park on Navarre Beach. The fireworks will begin at dusk and will be visible from many sound and gulf side locations.
- Town of Jay, Thursday, July 4, at the Bray-Hendrix Park, 5213 Booker Lane at dusk.
- Riverfest, Thursday, July 4, Downtown Milton at dark over the Blackwater River.
- Southern Raceway, 9359 Nichols Lake Road in Milton, Saturday, June 29 at 9 p.m. Alternate rain date is Saturday, July 6. Admission is required.

Grilling

Whether you are using a propane or charcoal grill, consider following these safety tips from Underwriter Laboratories:

- Position your grill a safe distance from your house or any building
- Never use a grill in a garage, any balcony, breezeway, carport, porch, under an awning or overhang
- Always have a spray bottle and a fire extinguisher handy
- Gas Grills:
 - Check the hoses on your gas grill for any cracking and brittleness to address potential leaks
 - Drip soapy water over the hoses and around the fittings. Any bubbles forming means there is a propane leak
 - Never start a gas grill with the lid closed
- Charcoal Grills
 - Never use gasoline or kerosene to light a charcoal fire. Both can cause an explosion
 - Dispose of charcoal away from kids and pets, and cool it down with a hose. Coals get HOT – up to 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit
 - Have a designated area for dumping hot coals and cool down with a hose

Insects

Spending recreational time outdoors means you will encounter insects such as mosquitoes or flies. If you plan on using insect-repelling citronella candles or tiki torches, please keep in mind:

- When using tiki torches or outdoor candles, never leave them unattended.
- Keep a fire extinguisher nearby. In the event of a fire, never use water to extinguish the flames as water will spread the fuel.

Santa Rosa County Mosquito Services encourages all residents to follow the four D' regarding mosquitoes.

- DUSK to DAWN - is the timeframe when mosquitoes are most active. Reduce or eliminate outdoor activity between dusk and dawn or take precautions to prevent mosquito bites.
- DRAIN - standing water. Water found in old tires, flowerpots, clogged rain gutters, leaky pipes and faucets, birdbaths and wading pools can be breeding sites for mosquitoes.
- DRESS - in light colored, long sleeves and pants when you are outside, especially in mosquito infested areas.

- DEET (N,N-diethyl-m-toluamide) - if you are going to be outside when mosquitoes are most active, make sure you apply insect repellent that contains DEET. Read and follow label instructions. Spray both exposed skin and clothing with repellent when outdoors.

Use of barricades policy: Free to parades and other events in Santa Rosa County that are sponsored by a chambers or government entities (Christmas parades, Mardi Gras, 4th of July etc...) or non profits, that are hosting events that are free and open to the public. The user is responsible for transportation of barricades, AND banners advertizing sponsors MUST be put on barricades. Others wanting to use the barricades must provide transportation and rent barricades at a cost of \$5 per barricade. Additional fees may be applicable if barricades are not returned within 7 days of pick up/delivery. Barricades will cost \$8 each if delivery is required. Average rental price for barricades is \$9-\$13 each through other vendors. SAFER barricades are a bargain.

Description This course provides training on and resources for personnel who require advanced application of the Incident Command System (ICS). The course expands upon information

covered in the ICS-100 and ICS-200 courses. Selection Criteria: This course should not be used as a "nice to have training" course! Attendee selections for this course are to be RESTRICTED to those individuals who are slated to / or are already identified to assume a supervisory role in expanding incidents (Type 3), or perform Emergency Operations Center (EOC) Agency Liaison or Agency Emergency Coordination Officer (ECO) roles. Note: During an expanding incident, some or all of the Command and General Staff positions may be activated, as well as Division/Group Supervisor and/or Unit Leader level positions.
